Summer Term Curriculum

This is a taster of our Summer term topic...

From takeaways to motorways: What did the Romans do for us? This is a question we intend to explore this term in KS2. In science our focus is forces, and investigation - using contexts such as chariot racing and Roman roads to test friction; aqueducts and Roman baths to explore water resistance and upthrust; and an ultimate KS2 Tug-of-War, to prove the balance of forces. With the theme of Horrible Histories, 'Ruthless, Rotten and Rebellious Romans' (our class names for this term), provide our class texts, where, through a range of non-fiction genres - we will be playing with power of words, sentences and essentially – humour! We will even be writing, performing and video editing our very own Horrible History sketch – Terry Dreary would be proud! With the help of our Mosaic art and design topic this term; in Maths (after we've conquered Roman Numerals), our learning turns to geometry, including angles, shape, sequences and pattern. As a history topic that drives all our subjects this term, we will also be exploring the Roman Empire; invasion and the impact on Britain; and key characters such as Claudius and Caesar, questioning just how effective their ruling was...

After half-term, still under the umbrella of Romans, our topic title is: Escape from Pompeii... Here we take a trip back in time to CE 79 and experience the last epic eruption of Mount Vesuvius, learning about the lives, legends and myths that surround this historic event, and the people of Pompeii. As a true 'force of Nature', we explore the physical geography of volcanoes, including plate tectonics, and in Science we test physical and chemical changes of state. Did you know the Romans made concrete out of lime mortar, ink from soot of burning candles, and evaporated salt from the Cheshire Hills? In art and design we will study Andy Warhol and his Volcano pop art, and our maths focuses on money, measure, time, volume and capacity.

This aims to be a fun-filled final term, with Romans not looking quite so Rotten or Ruthless!



We want to share our huge congratulations and heartfelt tiny tickers thanks to Chris Kelly who successfully completed the Southampton Marathon in under 4 hours!!!!!. He has raised £410 for our charity **Tiny Tickers** which is absolutely fabulous.

Our pupils have decided to try and run their own marathon, running a mile each, in their own time (to be completed by Friday 13th May). Staff will help with the outstanding miles!
